#### December

December was a busy month for the church in Lesotho. The first weekend of the month, one of the pastors got married. Church weddings are big occasions in Lesotho, especially when it is a pastor's wedding.

The next event was the annual baptism. This is always a memorable time for both new converts and pastors, but this year was unusual as we had two baptism services. In 2002 we planted a new church up in the mountains of Lesotho. This month several pastors took a tent to that church and held a weekend of revival to baptize all the new converts there. The following weekend was the baptism in Maseru. All together 55 people were baptized.

As usual, we have conferences in Africa to celebrate Christmas. This year the one in Lesotho began on Friday night and ended Sunday morning (Christmas Day). In South Africa, there was just a Christmas morning service, but about 250 people attended it.



After we helped there, we went to the Van der Merwe's for Christmas dinner. Since it is summer time, South Africans typically eat cold cut meats, fruits, and salads.

#### Mission Work?

Happy New Year! Parties, drunkenness, firecrackers, banging on pans—this is the way to bring in the new year in Lesotho. In our congregations, however, the Christians attend an all-night prayer meeting.

Among the Afrikaans people in South Africa, there is a tradition of beginning the new year in prayer. Usually on New Year's Eve (they call it "Old Year's Eve") we join our fellow missionaries and Christian friends for a meal and fellowship. Late in the evening, we gather for some singing and a devotional. Around 11:45 we have about 30 minutes of prayer through midnight; then everyone goes home. Some of our friends have kept this tradition for more than forty years!
