Bibles for the Nations


It's the time of year again when Hope International Missions takes Bibles into the bush and rural villages of Africa.



The greatest need for Bibles is in the rural areas.



On average we distribute 10,000 Bibles each year.



Some people wait a lifetime to get a Bible of their own at a price they can afford.

"So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God."

In the book of Romans, Paul asks, "How then shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher?" In many parts of Africa, the next logical question is, "How shall they preach without a Bible?"

Glenn will be leaving on the 13th of July with a team of six to join Pieter and Hester Marais in Zambia. Please pray much for them. Also pray for Stephanie and the girls who are staying behind.


